The "Quilting Cultures: An International Film Festival on Pluralism" was a three-day event held from February 11 to 13, 2025. The festival aimed to celebrate cultural diversity and promote the values of inclusivity and pluralism through the art of cinema. Festival Highlights

Opening Ceremony

- Way Back Home- A filmmaker's journey with his parents to their lost homeland in Bangladesh, exploring memories of Partition.
- Sons of The Clouds, The Last Colony- A documentary on Western Sahara's colonization and its impact on displaced refugees.
- Trans Kashmir- A documentary on Kashmiri transgender women, their cultural roles, and fight for rights.
- Chardi Kala: An Ode to Resilience- A documentary on the 2020 Indian farmers' protests and the spirit that sustained the movement.

Panel Discussions and Workshops

Alongside screenings, the festival featured interactive panel discussions with filmmakers, academics, and activists. Topics included:

- The Role of Cinema in Promoting Pluralism
- Representation of Minority Voices in Film
- Challenges and Opportunities for Cross-Cultural Storytelling
- The Impact of Digital Media on Cultural Narratives

Workshops were conducted to provide aspiring filmmaker Surbhi Dewan with insights into inclusive storytelling, film production techniques, and strategies for global outreach.

Audience Engagement and Community Participation

The festival encouraged audience participation through Q&A sessions, cultural exhibitions, and interactive booths representing various cultural organizations. After every movie the organizers allowed attendees to share their reflections and experiences related to pluralism.
